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# FACILITATOR INTRODUCTION





#### COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT ABOUT LEVEES

Communities should be regularly engaged about their flood threat including the nature and integrity of flood levees that they live behind. Community engagement can take numerous forms but ideally should allow for community participation through two-way dialogue between the SES and communities

One method of promoting two-way dialogue is through undertaking a workshop with at-risk residents and business operators. This guide has been developed based on the experience of conducting community workshops to engage with NSW communities about the levees.

Research has shown the importance of continued community engagement with communities protected by levees. Often such communities can develop a false sense of security, believing that a levee provides a higher level of protection than it actually does. Recent research before the Lismore 2018 flood showed that after the flood levee protecting the Central Business District was built in 2005, businesses reduced their levels of flood preparedness. Similar anecdotes are told about other levee protected communities across NSW.

The purpose of this guide is to assist facilitators in organising and conducting future workshops about levees. It consists of three key sections: 1) key messages, 2) how to organise a community levee workshop and 3) how to facilitate a community levee workshop. Workshops are suitable to provide basic awareness about levees to community members and SES volunteers.

### COMMUNITY LEVEE WORKSHOP PURPOSE

The purpose of undertaking a community levee workshop is to engage with communities to provide information about levees in their community, the nature of the flood threat and on how to prepare. It is also an opportunity for the SES, councils and other agencies to hear the views of community regarding likely behaviour, flood planning and to answer any questions the community may have.

Key outcomes sought for the community include:

- Enhanced awareness of local flood risk.
- Enhanced awareness of local flood levees and their operation.
- Enhanced awareness of the limitations of flood levees
- Enhanced knowledge of flood preparedness and response actions.
- Enhanced knowledge of local flood plans.

Key outcomes sought for the SES include:

- Improved knowledge of the community's views and likely behaviours during floods.
- Improved understanding of community networks and vulnerable people.

#### **SUMMARY OF FLOOD PREPAREDNESS MESSAGES**



### Important facts about levees

There is a strong and widespread public and in some cases even local government perception that levees remove the flood risk to life and property. This is certainly not the case. It is helpful to keep the following statements in mind when talking to communities about levees.

- Levees are generally designed to control a certain amount of floodwater. If larger floods occur floodwater will flow over the levee.
- Levees reduce the risk of flooding. But no levee can eliminate all flood risk.
- Dangerous flooding can result behind a levee when it is over topped or breached.
- Levees can fail through means other than over topping including erosion or seepage through the levee.
- Levee systems are not designed to provide protection for people, they are designed to reduce the frequency of which houses and businesses are flooded.



# What if a levee is likely to overtop or be breached?

- The SES has developed and maintains a flood plan for your local area in case a flood threatens to overtop or breach the levee.
- In the event that a flood threatens to overtop or breach a levee, the SES will issue evacuation warnings to at-risk residents and business operators.



#### How can I prepare now?

 You can undertake some simple steps to be better prepared including:

- Knowing about your flood risk
- · Checking your insurance
- Preparing an emergency plan or kit



### Where will flood warnings be available from?

- Flood warnings are issued during floods to provide notice of when floods may occur and their magnitude. Flood predictions are made by the Bureau of Meteorology.
- Warning are available from:
  - Local radio stations
  - SES website
  - Bureau of Meteorology website
  - Social media



### What should I do if I need to evacuate?

- Act early as roads may close
- Raise valuables as high as possible
- Tale clothing, medications and pets with you
- Tell people where you are going and look out for others that might be in need
- Don't return until it is safe

### Resources & Organisation



### Follow these instructions to organise a community levee workshop.

#### **Resources required include:**

- Room at hall or club with chairs and seats
- Understanding levees guide
- Local flood, catchment and levee location maps
- Relevant local flood photos
- Case studies of previous levee overtopping or breaches
- White board
- Butchers paper
- White board markers and pens
- Evaluation forms
- Audio visual aids such as laptop and projector
- Pin board
- Microphone
- Al size street maps

If there is to be catering, ensure that it is arranged, and timing of meals to be served is clear.

Ensure that a technical representative from the local council is present to provide a presentation on the nature of the levee. If not, get input from the local council before undertaking presentations.

Invitations should be extended to:

- Community members
- Local business chamber
- Local council staff and employees
- Other local emergency services: for example, Police, NSW Fire and Rescue, Ambulance NSW, Volunteer Rescue Association and Rural Fire Service
- Infrastructure operators: for example, energy
- Office of Environment and Heritage
- Others deemed relevant.

### Resources & Organisation



The workshop can be promoted via the media, community groups and social media. An invitation can be constructed for use on social media utilising local flood photos. See **Figure 1** below for an example.

Establish a process for registering RSVPs and ensure liaison occurs with the venue to ensure facilities will be adequate.


Consider developing a tailored short guide summarising key messages for the community or utilise the generic levee factsheet.

Read through the understanding levees guide and familiarise yourself with the local flood plan and flood intelligence cards prior to facilitating the workshop.

Prior to the workshop, arrange a meeting with all presenters and conduct a run through of the agenda.

Get to the venue an hour before to set-up and resolve any last-minute issues.

#### Room Preparation



Set the room up so that people will be seated in groups (café style). Aim for the environment to be friendly and relaxed and avoid an 'us and them' atmosphere. For an example see **Figure 2** below.

Establish a reflections board with post-it notes or a white board where people at any stage can record a thought or a question.

Establish knowledge walls for community participants to read and view information. Information to be displayed should include:

- Flood mapping and key gauge heights
- Local flood photos
- Maps of the catchment area
- Maps that show where levees are located
- Case studies of previous levee overtopping or breaches




Figure 3: Example of a knowledge wall

During and After the Workshop




**Record** any points made during the workshop to produce any follow-on materials such as frequently asked questions or planning documents.

#### **Opening**



Follow these notes when facilitating the workshop. They may be altered to suit local circumstances.

Welcome to the workshop today.

My name is [xxxx] from [xxxxx] I am the facilitator for today's workshop.

The purpose of today's workshop is to share information about flooding in [xxxx community] and the town's levee/s and discuss options for emergency response in the event that the levee/s may be at-risk of overtopping or breaching.

The outcomes of the workshop will assist residents and businesses to review their flood plans and with your feedback, SES can scope further engagement activities.

- Everyone's opinions are valuable: please give everyone an opportunity to have their say to express their opinions and concerns. There may be some conflicting opinions on occasions between participants: please respect these and agree to disagree.
- Feel free to ask questions throughout there is no such thing as a silly question.
- Any problems or issues please feel free to raise them directly with me.

Discussion Exercise



### Groups to be formed with associated workshop materials.

Provide each group with street maps of the town / suburb and ask them to draw areas that are at risk of flooding and any aspects of flood behaviour.

Once complete, ask each group to consider:

- What is the community's experience with flooding?
- What are the community's main concerns regarding flooding?

Summarise the key themes listed and present these to the group. Provide groups an opportunity to provide further comments.

### Presentation on the Levee



A presentation to be provided by [the levee operator] on how the levee works, its level of protection and impacts on the community if levee breaching or overtopping was to occur.

Presentation to cover:

- Where are the levees?
- What is their purpose?
- How are they operated?
- What are the risks associated with levees failing or overtopping?
- What areas would be inundated if any of the levees failed or overtopped?
- Any backwater flooding issues

Q&A Session



SES, Council, Police and other relevant representatives to form a panel and answer questions about the levee and possible impacts. The facilitator will facilitate the discussion and ask any additional questions.

Possible questions to prompt:

- What is the current condition of the levee/s?
- When would the levee/s overtop?
- How will residents be warned if a flood was to threaten?
- How much warning time would residents have?
- How does Council monitor the levee/s during a flood?
- What would happen if the levee/s breached rather than overtopped?
- Have levee/s settled since construction?

Facilitator to guide participants through materials contained on the knowledge wall and encourage them to view materials.

#### Planning Exercise



Within the same groups already formed, community members to be encouraged to participate in a flood scenario exercise to help inform local planning and understand community behaviour. Given the information presented so far during the workshop lets discuss a scenario together. If a flood was predicted to overtop the levee:

- 1) What actions would you expect to be undertaken by emergency services?
- 2) What actions would you as community members likely undertake?
- 3) What information would you need to help your decision making?
- 4) Where are the most vulnerable people in the community? How can they be engaged with?
- 5) How can community members be assisting each other during a flood event?
- 6) What key community groups or networks could be involved in planning and responding to floods?

#### Planning Exercise



- 5) How can community members be assisting each other during a flood event?
- 6) What key community groups or networks could be involved in planning and responding to floods?

A nominated scribe to make notes on butcher's paper.

Provide time between each question for community representatives to complete.

At conclusion each group to display their notes around the room for other groups to view.

Facilitator to summarise key themes and allow for any questions.
